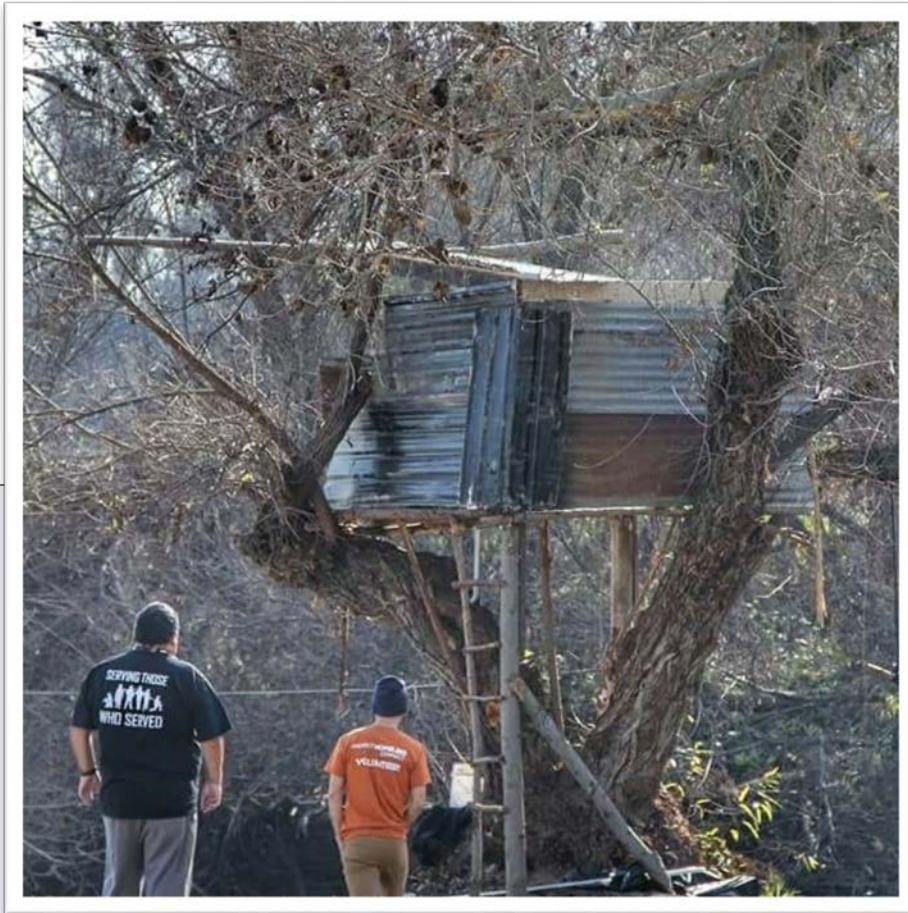

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Summary

Each year, the Kings/Tulare Homeless Alliance (Alliance) conducts a Point in Time (PIT) count of the number of people experiencing homelessness within Kings and Tulare Counties. Information gathered through the PIT survey is used by the Alliance to better understand the issues associated with homelessness, including causes of homelessness, service needs of the homeless, the region's unmet housing needs, and trends over time of homelessness in the region.

The 2018 PIT was held on the night of January 24, 2018. This one-day PIT survey provides a snapshot of the adults, children and unaccompanied youth living in Kings and Tulare Counties, who meet HUD's definition of homeless. It is important to note that the results of the count are influenced by a variety of factors such as weather, number of volunteers canvassing and the ability to locate and engage with people experiencing homelessness on the night of the count.

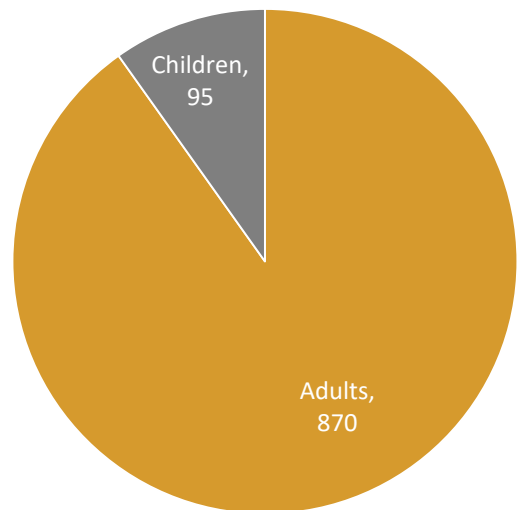
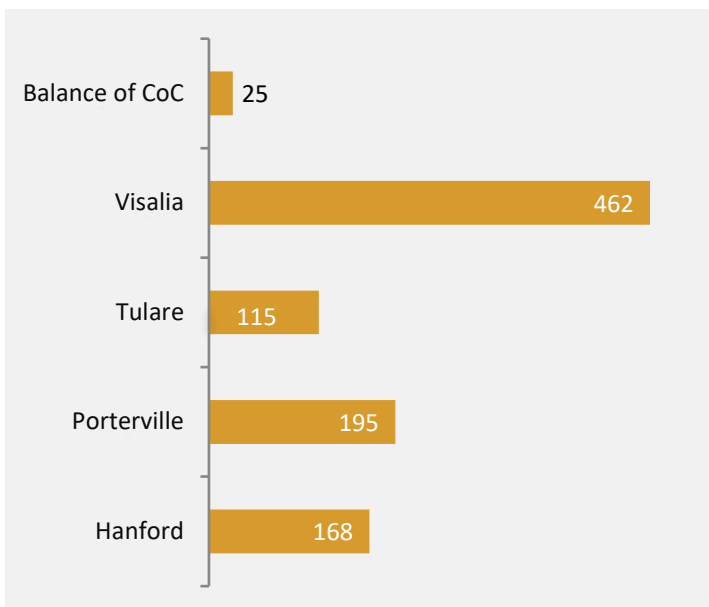
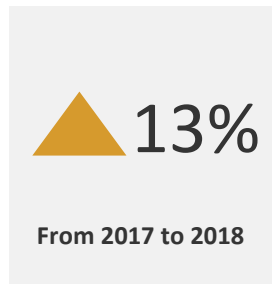
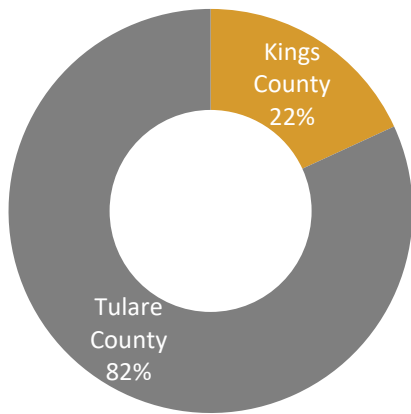
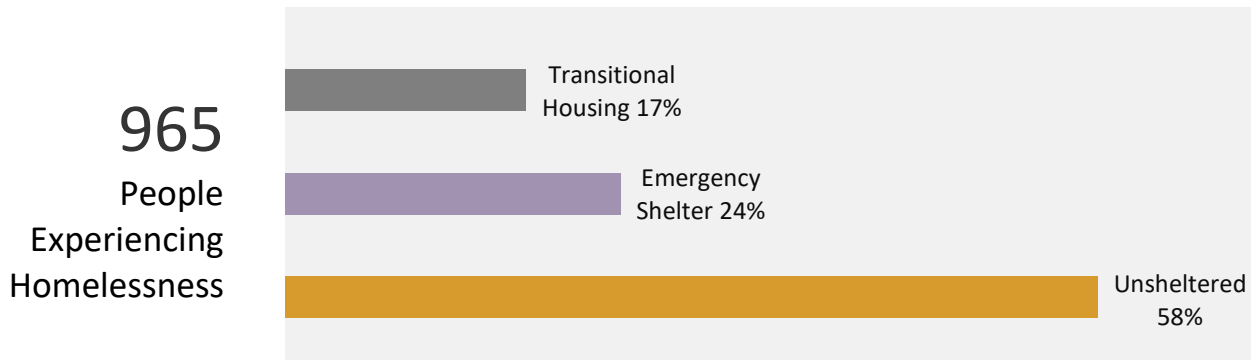

FIGURE 1. HOMELESS TREND 2009-2018

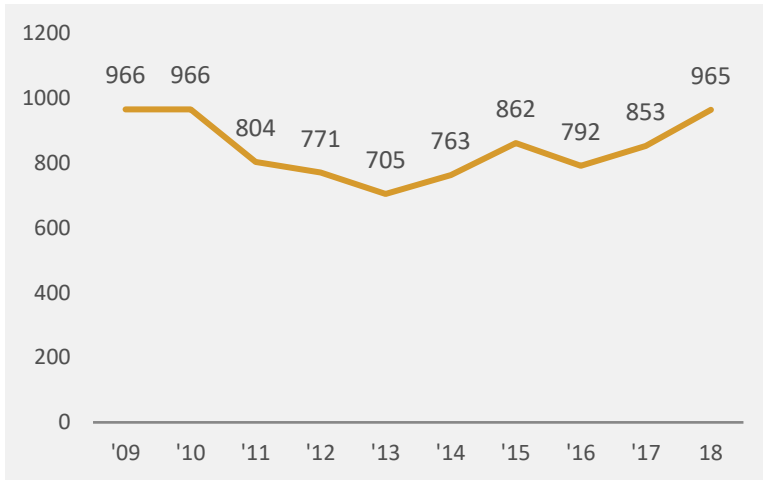
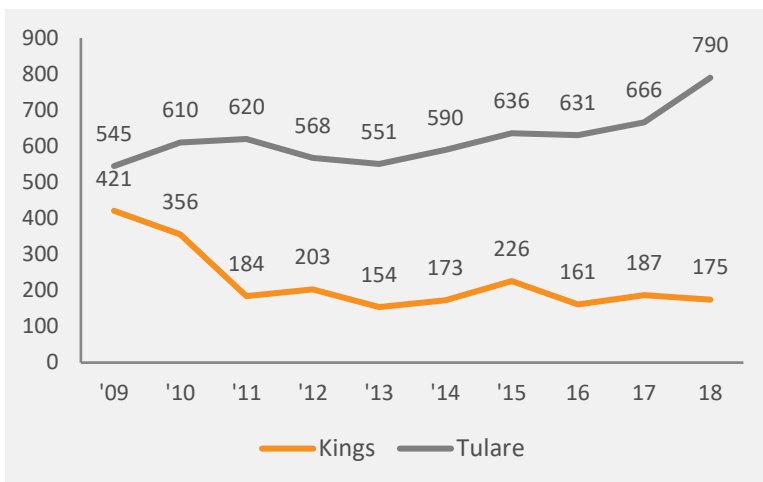


FIGURE 2. HOMELESS TREND BY COUNTY 2009-2018



Trends

Homelessness increased by 13%
(965 in 2018 vs. 853 in 2017).

Homelessness in Kings/Tulare has been increasing steadily since a low of 705 people in 2013.

Tulare County experienced a 19% increase in homelessness over prior year, while the homeless population in Kings County decreased by 5%.

Visalia continues to be home to nearly half (48%) of the homeless population in Kings/Tulare Counties.

Porterville has the second largest concentration of homelessness (20%), followed by Hanford (17%), Tulare (12%), and balance of region (3%).

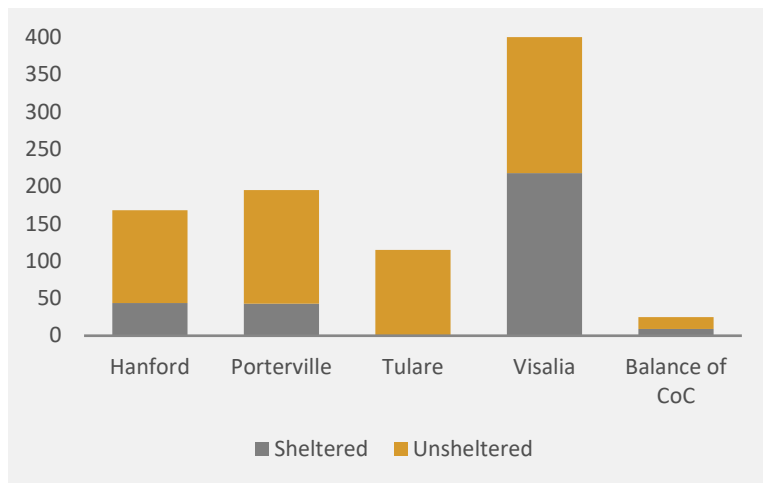

Where People Slept

Unsheltered

People with a primary nighttime residence that is a place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings, including a car, park, abandoned building, bus or train station, airport, or camping ground.

Sheltered

People sleeping in a shelter designated to provide temporary housing to homeless persons. This includes emergency shelters and transitional housing programs.

Tulare has the largest percentage of their homeless population living in unsheltered situations (99%), followed by Porterville (78%), Hanford (74%) and Visalia (53%).

Introduction

The PIT is a count of sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons on a single night in January. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires that a PIT count is conducted by every community receiving McKinney-Vento funding for homeless services. Annual counts include only those who meet HUD's definition of homelessness which include only those who are sleeping in in emergency shelters, transitional housing, safe havens or unsheltered situations on the night of the PIT count.

PIT Counts provide valuable information regarding the current state of homelessness in our community and nationally. The PIT also provides information on the extent to which homeless persons live with disabling conditions or belong to other subpopulations.

The findings in this report are estimates of how many people are homeless on a given night throughout Kings and Tulare Counties. The PIT Count in Kings and Tulare Counties identified 965 people experiencing homelessness on the night of January 24, 2018.

Data for the 2018 report were collected in the following three categories, as required by HUD:

1. Persons in households with at least one adult and one child.

This category includes households with one adult and at least one child under age 18.

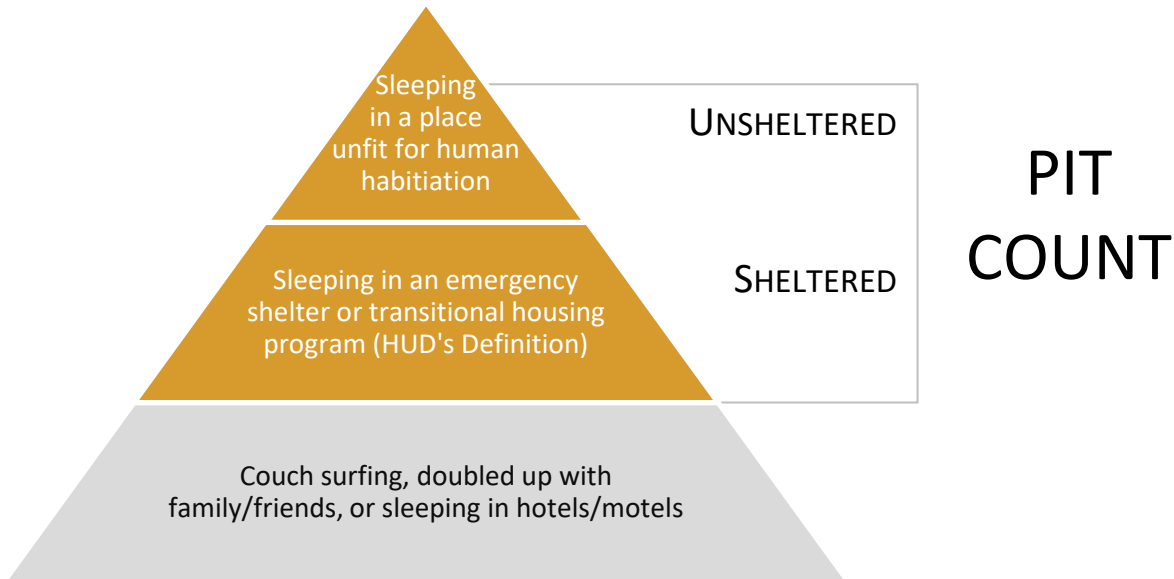
2. Persons in households without children.

This category includes single adults, adult couples with no children, and groups of adults (including adult parents with their adult children).

3. Persons in households with only children.

This category includes persons under age 18, including children in one-child households, adolescent parents (under age 18) and their children, adolescent siblings, or other household configurations composed only of children.

Similar to past enumerations, the 2018 PIT count does not include persons who were couch surfing, precariously housed, or "doubled up". Per the HUD definition of homelessness, persons who reported spending the night in a house or apartment, a permanent housing program, medical institution, or jail, were defined as housed.



The data provided by the PIT survey is not an absolute measure of the extent of homelessness in Kings and Tulare Counties. Rather, it provides a representative sample and trends of homeless persons in the region. This enables the Alliance and other planning bodies to tailor the activities and calculate the unmet needs of people experiencing homelessness or at risk of becoming homeless.

The information provided by the PIT not only increases our understanding of the homelessness situation, but is also a tool to monitor progress and create achievable goals in our work to end homelessness, including:

- Assist local planning efforts by identifying unmet needs;
- Approximate the size of our homeless population and its characteristics;
- Increase awareness about homelessness issues,
- Provide an avenue to identify shifting needs and prioritize resources accordingly;
- Create targeted intervention for homeless sub-populations;
- Outline main community goals for the upcoming year;
- Define benchmarks for tracking and measuring progress on the reduction of homelessness; and
- Identify strategies that provide positive outcomes to decrease the incidence of homelessness.

The annual PIT survey count requires a significant amount of coordination from volunteers, agencies and the community at large. As such, the Alliance would like to extend gratitude to the survey team leaders, volunteers, sponsors, agencies, and survey participants that helped make the count a success.

Data Collection Methodology

This study aims to gain an understanding of the number and trends of adults, children and unaccompanied youth living in Kings and Tulare Counties who meet HUD's definition of homeless. The PIT Count uses the HUD definition of homelessness in Federal regulation 24 CFR §578.3. Data are collected at both the individual and household level by utilizing two methods: the questionnaire and the HMIS (Homeless Management Information System) Database.

The Kings/Tulare PIT Count uses a census methodology, in which all homeless persons are counted throughout the bi-county region. This counting approach provides a direct and complete count of all people and their characteristics.

Questionnaire

Basic demographic and socio-economic information of individuals and households who are living in uninhabitable locations and of persons residing in shelters that do not actively enter information into HMIS was collected through administering a questionnaire (Appendix B). The survey instrument captured demographic information such as age, income, relationship to head of household and place of habitation, along with duration of homelessness, and reason for current episode of homelessness.

HMIS Database

The sheltered portion of the count is extracted from data in the region's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). HMIS includes data on all persons who occupied an emergency voucher, shelter or transitional housing bed on the night of the count. This information is available from emergency shelters and transitional housing programs that actively enter client level data into HMIS. This includes all the same demographic and socio-economic data fields captured by the questionnaire.

As of January 24, 2018 there were 39 programs in Kings and Tulare counties that actively enter data into HMIS. This represents 98% of the programs providing housing to the homeless population within the bi-county region.

Surveying

The PIT Count collected information on where homeless people slept on the night of January 24, 2018. It was held in conjunction with Project Homeless Connect (PHC) events held in Hanford, Porterville, Tulare and Visalia on January 25-26, 2018. As in prior years, combining the PHC and PIT events have led to a tremendous success in improved data quality and coverage.

In order to successfully complete the count, volunteers engaged in intake and assessment through PHC, street canvassing, meal site counts and residential surveys, while the HMIS method was implemented through residential emergency and transitional housing programs that actively enter data into the database.

Service Count: During the four PHC events, volunteers interviewed clients via an intake form to collect information on their homelessness and demographics. All intake volunteers were required to attend a specialized training session prior to their assignment at PHC. Since 2017, volunteers have entered intake information directly into the HMIS.

Street Canvassing: The questionnaire took approximately 15 minutes to complete and was conducted in either English or Spanish. Teams of volunteers were sent out into the community to pre-assigned locations. In preparation to administer the questionnaire, a list of locations throughout the community where homeless persons congregate was created. The PIT committee mapped census areas based on cities and unincorporated areas of Kings and Tulare counties, highlighting “hot spots” (i.e. parks, soup kitchen, recycling centers, the river) within each region where the homeless are known to congregate.

Team leaders with experience in homeless census tracking were assigned to individual mapped regions. They were responsible for recruiting volunteers for their respective PIT team and were strongly encouraged to include homeless, formerly homeless and bilingual volunteers. All team leaders and volunteers were required to attend a mandatory training in preparation for the survey. When possible, canvass teams were partnered with service providers in order to disseminate information about existing programs and services at the same time.

Meal Site Count: Volunteers administered questionnaires at sites where free meals are served to the public. The meal site count is focused on identifying and interviewing people who are homeless, but did not utilize a shelter on the night of January 24, 2018.

Residential Surveys: Residential surveys utilized both research methods. For the emergency and transitional shelter programs that actively enter client information into HMIS, the database administrator extracted the necessary data fields from the system to provide reliable, comparable data for the PIT. Shelter programs who do not participate in HMIS were visited in order to capture PIT information on their clients residing in their program the night of the PIT count.

Limitations of the Study

While the PIT count provides valuable information about homelessness in our community, it has some limitations that are important to keep in mind:

Variations in site participation: The PIT count relies heavily on the participation of social service organizations, many of whom are stretched thin and have limited staff capacity. While every effort is made to ensure that all relevant organizations participate, there is inevitably some variation in the level and rate of participation of sites/ service providers from year to year.

Refusals to participate: Some respondents refuse to participate in the count because they want to preserve their privacy, do not trust service providers, or do not consider themselves homeless.

Difficulty finding people: It is widely acknowledged in all the research on homelessness that surveys undercount homeless populations. It is easy to “miss” homeless individuals and families -- they might not receive services at the agencies where homeless persons were counted on the night of the PIT Count, or if they do frequent a particular agency, they might not be there during the count. Youth on their own, recently homeless individuals and families who are doubled up with friends and relatives are often underrepresented among those who access homeless services.¹

Unsheltered homeless people are particularly difficult to count. By definition, they are living on the street, in automobiles and other kinds of uninhabitable, temporary housing situations that limit the opportunity to complete the survey.² People enter and leave homelessness frequently and may become homeless shortly after the PIT Count. Furthermore, some individuals and families experiencing homelessness avoid accessing available services and try to hide from view. Even those who are not hiding are often difficult to locate. During the day, homeless camps are typically vacant and there is only a narrow window of time when campers can be located and questionnaires completed for the count.

Unaccompanied youth and children: As in years past, the Alliance experienced difficulty identifying homeless youth because they are not accessing services or frequenting typical homeless “hot spots”; do not appear homeless to enumerators; are more mobile throughout the day; and are more intermittently homeless.

Summary of Limitations

As explained by the United States Inter-Agency Council on Homelessness, “Due to barriers that exist for young people in accessing adult-only shelters and their lack of connection to most social services, many if not most youth experiencing homelessness go uncounted” (U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness, 2012a).

Self-reported data: Self-reported data should not be viewed as an exact number. Individuals choose whether or not to answer these highly personal questions or to do so truthfully. Therefore, the numbers provided in this report are only reflective of those who chose to answer these questions.

Validity and Reliability

Validity and reliability of the quantitative methodology was endorsed throughout the process. The volunteers who conducted the questionnaire were required to complete a mandatory training and report to their experienced team lead. In order to avoid duplication, volunteers asked each person if they had already completed an interview. Furthermore, the survey instrument collected personal identifying information that was used for de-duplication purposes.

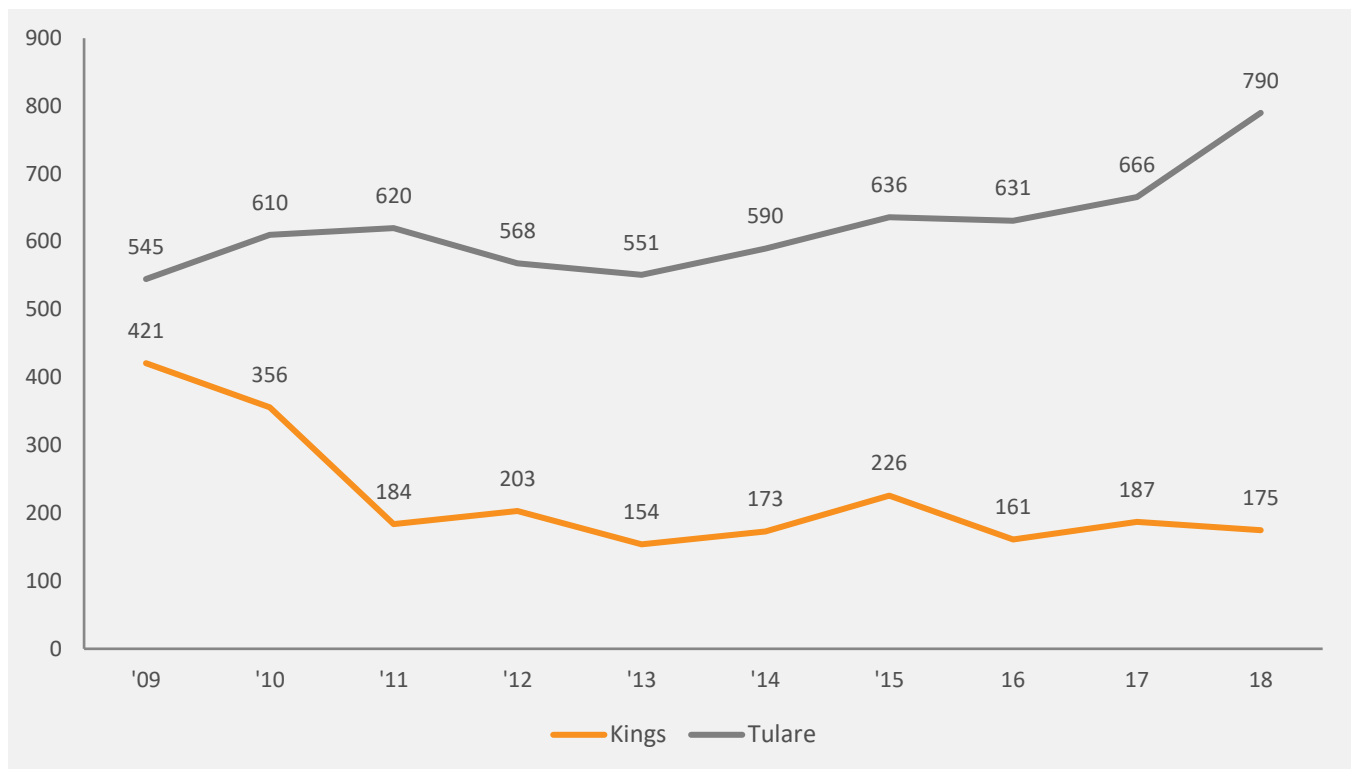
The database administrator ran multiple data quality tests to ensure the accuracy and completeness of the subpopulation data entered into HMIS and to ensure data quality of all completed questionnaires.

Survey Findings

The 2018 PIT Count collected data on individuals and families experiencing homelessness on the night of Wednesday, January 24, 2018 in Kings and Tulare Counties. The Count identified 650 people who were sleeping in unsheltered situations and 315 people that were sleeping in an emergency shelter or transitional housing. In all, 965 people met HUD’s definition of homelessness on the night of the count.

Tulare County represents the majority of homelessness within the bi-county region (82%). The number of homeless increased sharply in Tulare County and decreased slightly in Kings County. Tulare County experienced a 19% increase over 2017 (790 in 2018 vs. 666 in 2017), while Kings County decreased by 6% (175 in 2018 vs. 187 in 2017).

According to the HUD’s 2017 Annual Homeless Assessment Report, there were 553,742 people experiencing homelessness in the United States. This figure represents .18% of the nation’s total population. Table highlights the number of people experiencing homelessness counted during the PIT as a percentage of its total population in the bi-county region. Hanford (.31%), Porterville (.36%), and Visalia (.37%) greatly exceed the national average of .18%.

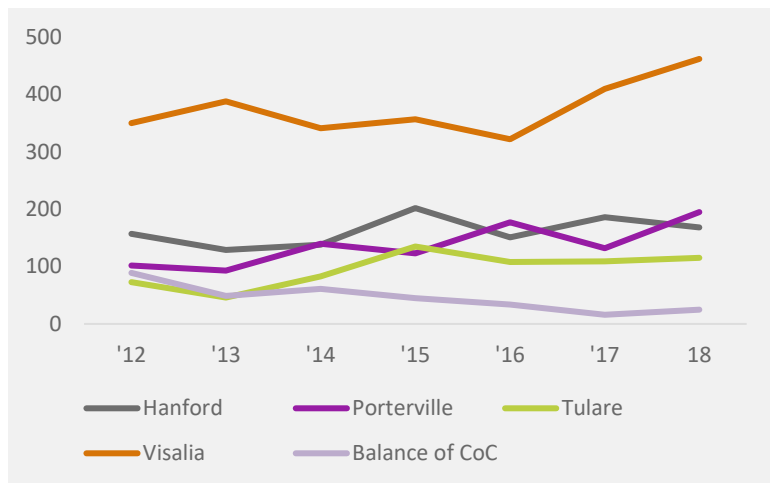

Geographic Analysis

Tulare County continues to be the home to the majority of people experiencing homelessness.

Hanford was the only area in the bi-county region **to have a decrease in homelessness** over 2017.

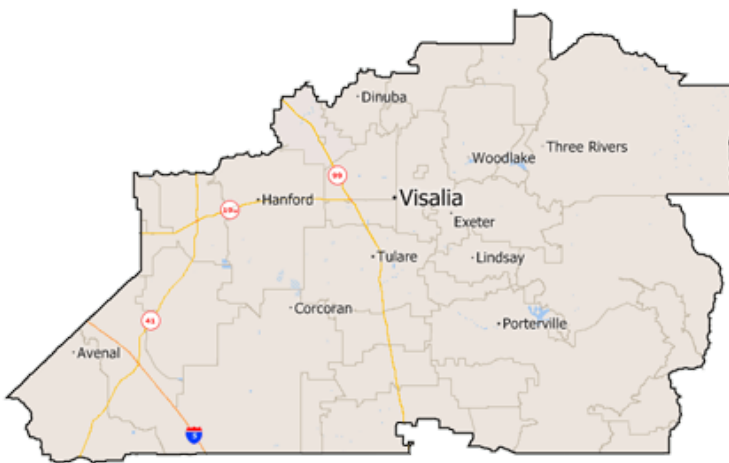
The number of people experiencing homelessness in Porterville rose by 48% over 2017 (195 in 2018 vs. 132 in 2017).

The four largest cities in the bi-county region **have experienced an increase in homelessness since 2012**: Hanford (+7%), Porterville (+91%), Tulare (+58%), Visalia (+32%).

Population Comparison

Hanford, Porterville and Visalia continue to have a **substantially higher homeless prevalence** than the **nationwide average** of .18%.

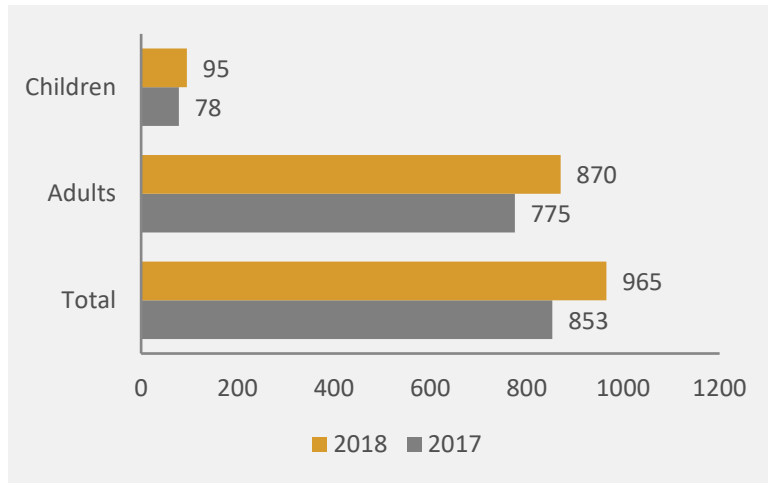
The **homeless prevalence in Hanford** decreased slightly from .34% in 2017 to .31% in 2018.

Porterville experienced a **significant increase** from .24% in 2017 to .36% in 2018.

The **homeless prevalence in Tulare** remained **virtually unchanged** from .18% in 2017 to .19% 2018.

Visalia's homeless prevalence **increased** from .33% in 2017 to .37% in 2018.

FIGURE 4. ADULTS AND CHILDREN

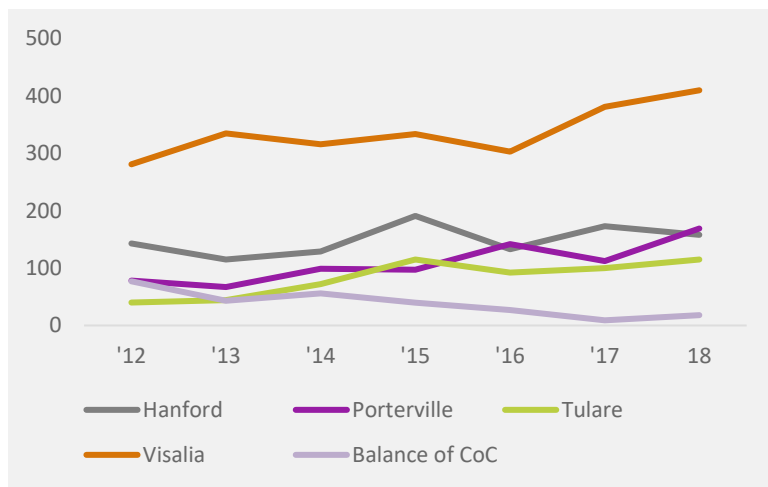


Adults & Children

870 (90%) were adults experiencing homelessness.

95 (10%) were children experiencing homelessness.

The number of children experiencing homelessness

increased in 2018 (95 in 2018 vs. 78 in 2017).

Visalia had the sharpest increase in the number of children experiencing homelessness in 2018 (52 in 2018 vs. 29 in 2017) followed by Porterville (26 in 2018 vs. 20 in 2017).

FIGURE 6. TRENDS BY CITY, CHILDREN

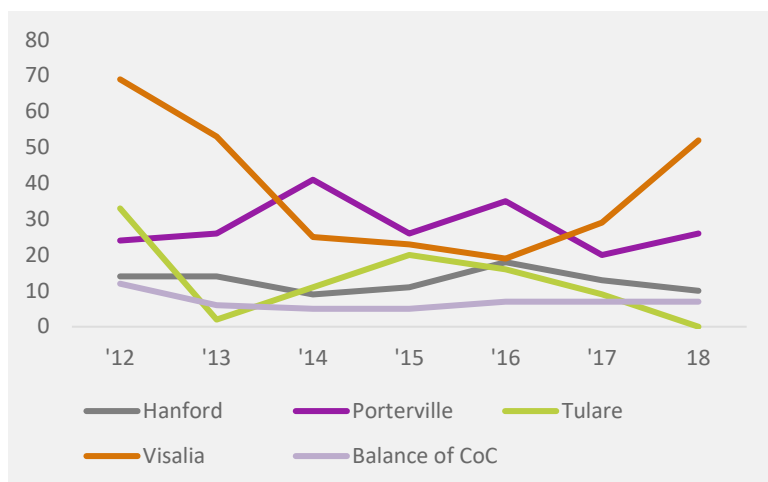




FIGURE 7. HOUSEHOLD COMPOSITION

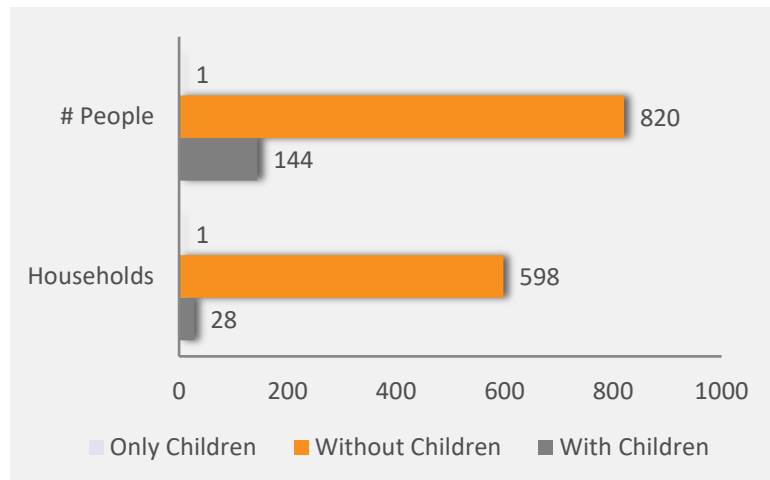

Household Composition

Over three-quarters (**85%**) of people experiencing homelessness are in **single households or households without children.**

In **households with children**, the **average family size is 3.2.**

In 2018, the **average household size rose significantly** over 2017 in both counties. Kings County experienced a 20% increase and Tulare County experienced a 31% increase.

The number of **households with children decreased** by 24% (28 in 2018 vs. 37 in 2017).

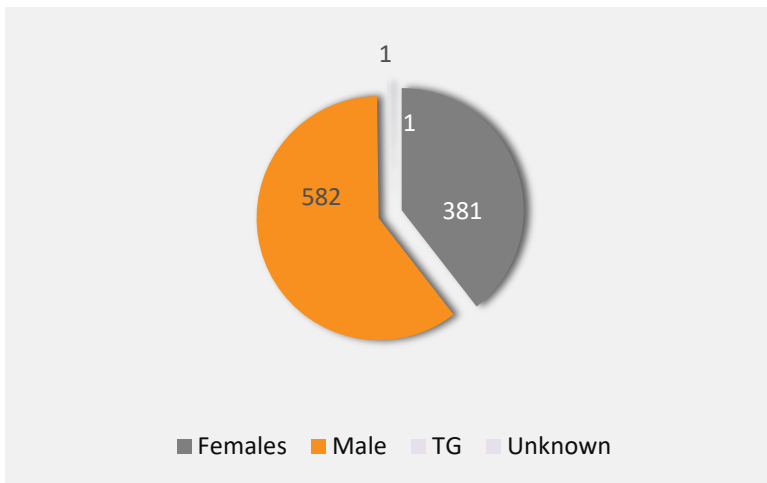

Race & Ethnicity

The **majority** of **homeless** persons identified their ethnicity as **Non-Hispanic/ Non-Latino** (56%), unchanged from 2017.

Over three-quarters (**83%**) of respondents **identify as White**.

Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islanders (1%) and **Asians** (1%) continue to **have a very low prevalence** amongst the **homeless population** in **Kings and Tulare Counties**.

It is important to note that **race classification is exclusive of ethnicity** responses.

Males continue to represent the majority of homeless persons with 60% prevalence versus female (39%). These figures have remained consistent with results from prior years.

FIGURE 9. CURRENT HOUSING

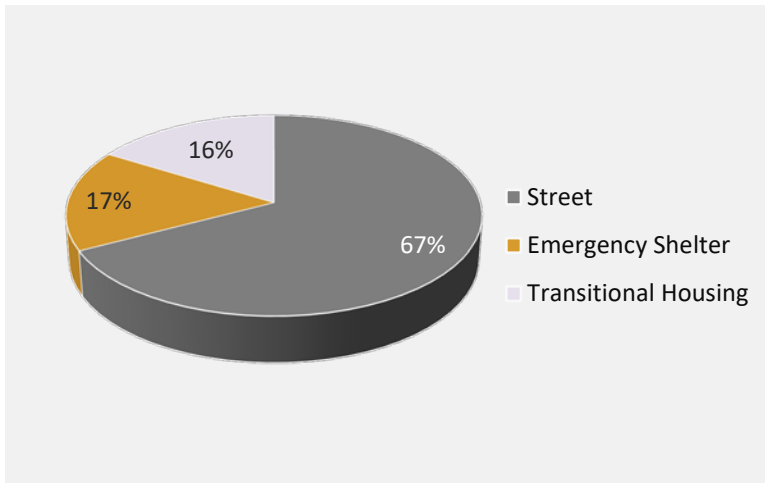


FIGURE 10. SHELTERED VS. UNSHELTERED, BY CITY

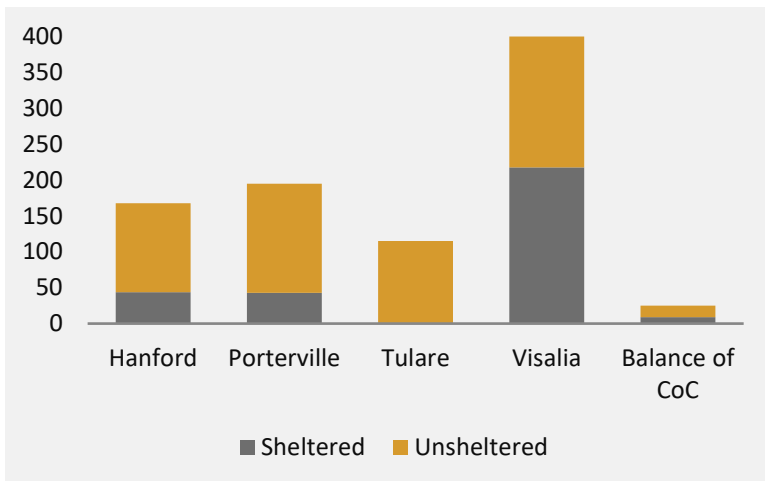
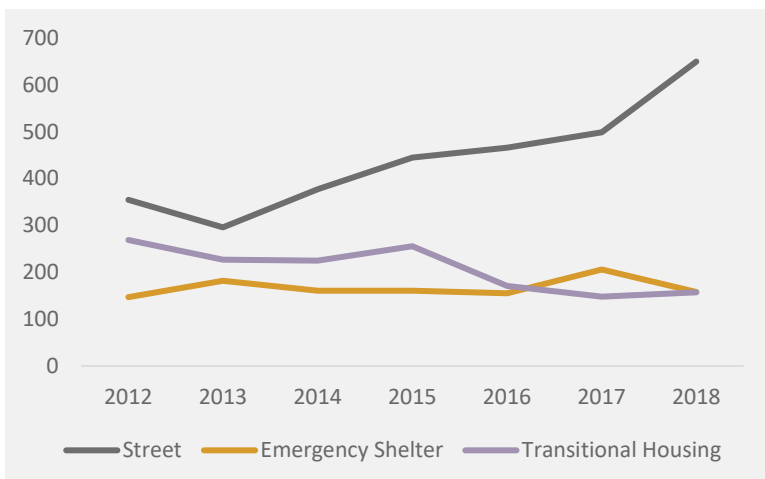


FIGURE 11. CURRENT HOUSING, TREND OVER TIME



Current Housing

People sleeping in a place not meant for human habitation rose significantly from 2017 (650 in 2018 vs. 499 in 2017).

The number of people sleeping in transitional housing increased slightly (6%), while those sleeping in emergency shelters decreased by 23% over 2017.

Since 2012, the number of people sleeping in places not meant for human habitation rose by 83% (650 in 2018 vs. 355 in 2012).

Over a seven-year period, those sleeping in transitional housing declined by 31% (157 in 2018 vs. 269 in 2012). Emergency shelter usage remained virtually unchanged (158 in 2018 vs. 147 in 2012).

FIGURE 12. UNSHELTERED HOMELESS BY CITY

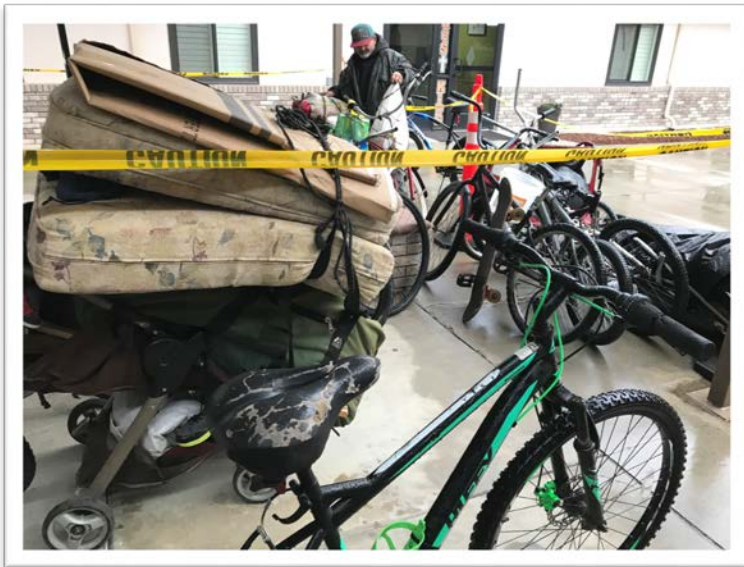
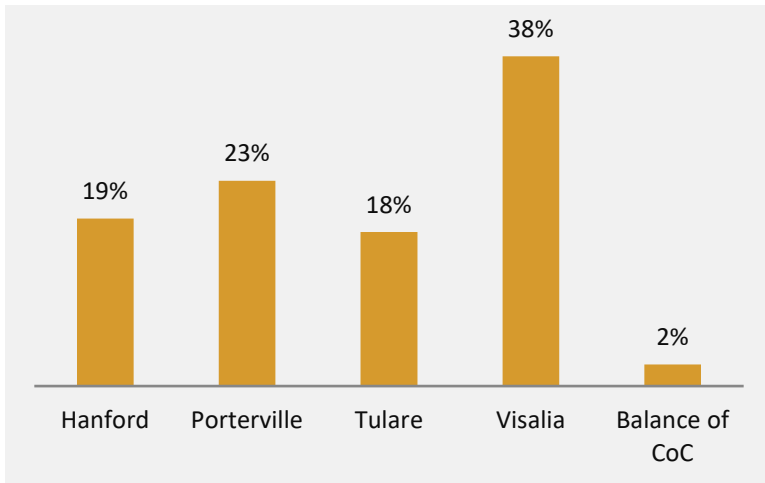

Unsheltered Homelessness

Nearly all persons (99%) experiencing homelessness in Tulare are unsheltered.

Unsheltered persons in Porterville comprise 78% of the homeless population, followed by Hanford (74%) and Visalia (53%).

Porterville experienced the largest increase in unsheltered homelessness over 2017 with a 75% increase (152 in 2018 vs. 87 in 2017). Visalia and Tulare also experienced increases, while Hanford remained unchanged from 2017.

Nationally, 35% of the homeless population are sleeping in unsheltered situations. In Kings and Tulare Counties, the prevalence of unsheltered homelessness is 67%. (2017 AHAR)

There were 8 children sleeping in unsheltered situations.

67% of people sleeping in unsheltered situations have been homeless for a year or longer.

FIGURE 13. SHELTERED HOMELESS BY CITY

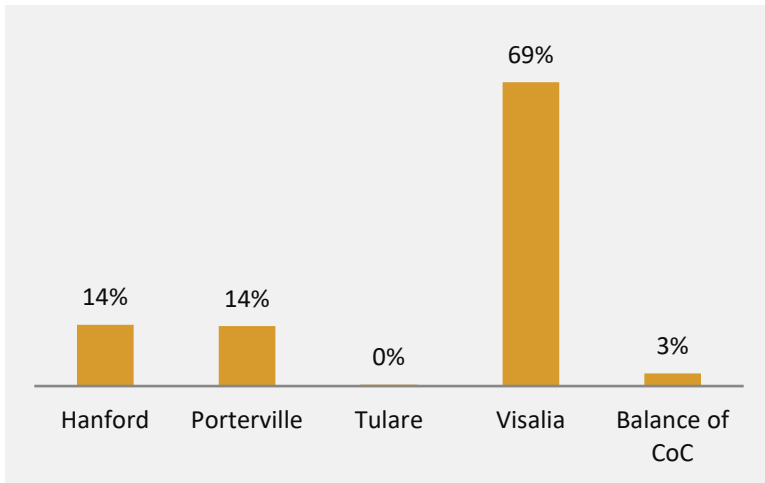

Sheltered Homelessness

315 people (32%) were sleeping in sheltered locations. This is a decrease from 2017 when 354 persons (42%) were sleeping in sheltered situations.

Over half (69%) of the sheltered population live in Visalia, while less than 1% live in Tulare.

Nine out of every ten households with children are sheltered. This figure rose by 4% over 2017.

Average family size for households with children in sheltered situations is 3.25.

Nearly all cities in the bi-county region saw a decrease in sheltered homelessness. The only exception was Visalia, which remained unchanged from 2017.

FIGURE 14. CHRONIC HOMELESS TREND, 2012-2018

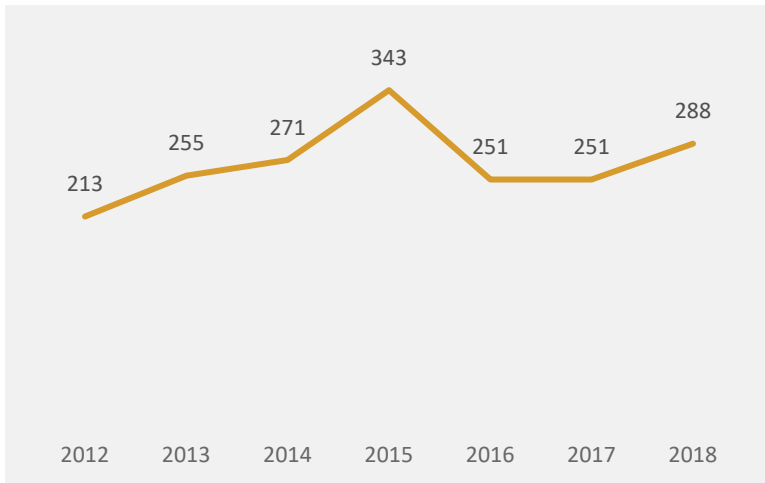
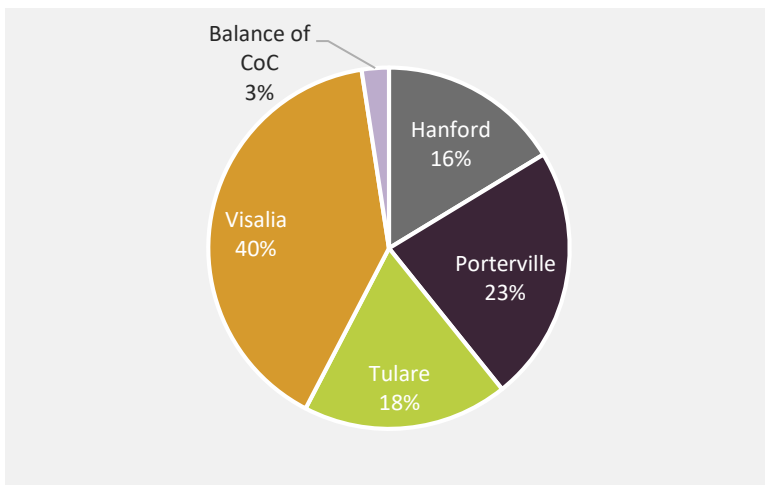


FIGURE 15. CHRONIC HOMELESS BY CITY, 2018



Chronic Homelessness

26% of people experiencing homelessness **meet the definition of chronic homelessness**. This figure exceeds the national prevalence by nearly 63%. (2017 AHAR)

There has been a **35% increase in chronic homelessness** since 2012 (288 in 2018 vs. 213 in 2012) and a **15% increase over 2017** (251).

The average **length of homelessness for a chronically homeless person** in Kings and Tulare Counties is **4.47 years**.

Nearly all chronic homeless persons are sleeping in unsheltered situations (95% or 274 persons).

Almost two-thirds of those experiencing chronic homelessness are males (61%).

Tulare continues to have the highest prevalence of chronic homelessness in relation to their total homeless population (46%), followed by Porterville (34%), Hanford (28%), and Visalia (25%).

FIGURE 16. HOMELESS VETERANS BY SHELTER TYPE

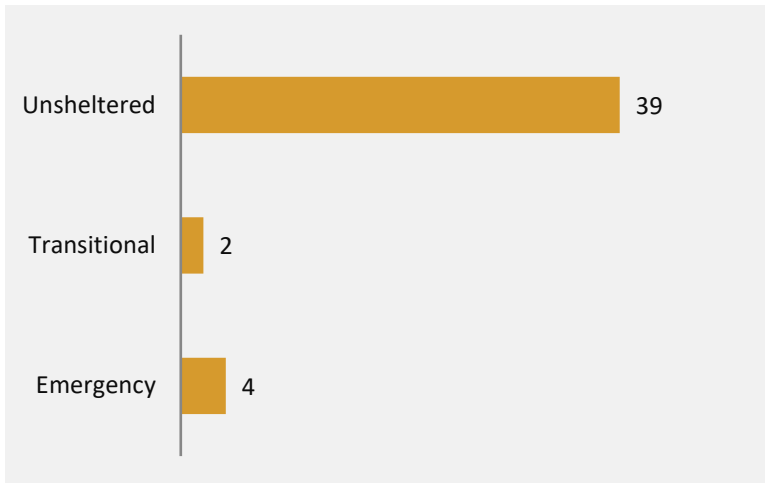


FIGURE 17. GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION, VETERANS

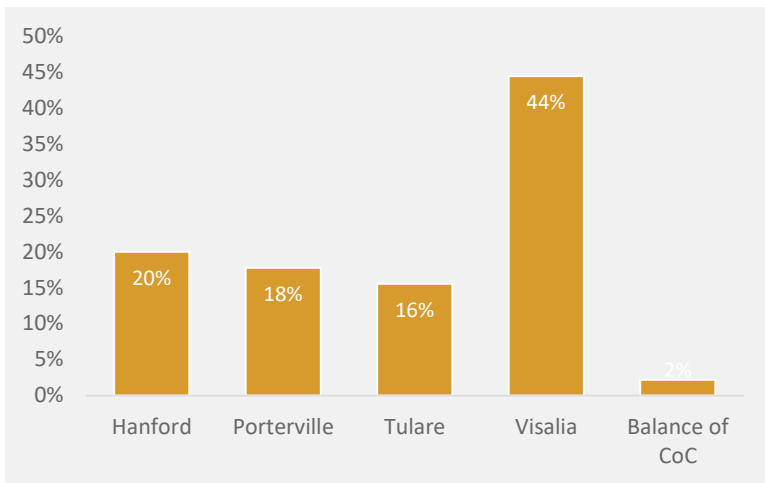
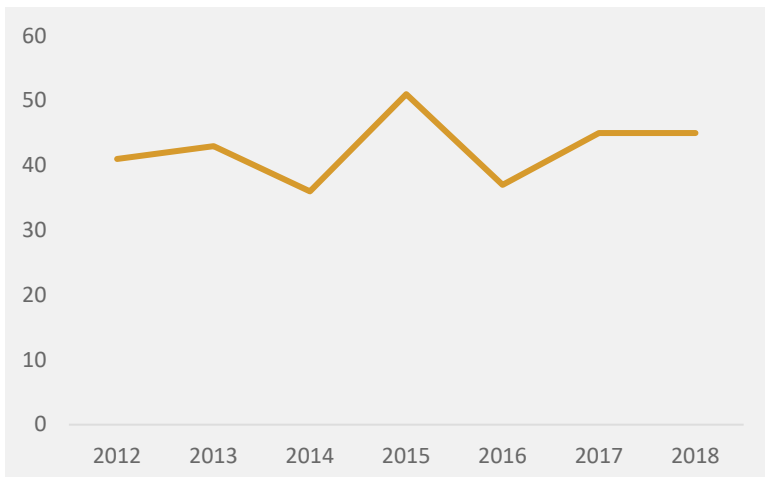


FIGURE 18. VETERAN TREND, 2012-2018



Veterans

Nine out of every ten **veterans** (87%) experiencing homelessness **are** sleeping in **unsheltered** situations.

Eighty percent (**80%**) cite **Kings or Tulare County** as their last **permanent residence** before becoming homeless.

Almost half (**46%**) of **veterans** experiencing homelessness in Kings and Tulare Counties **are chronically homeless**.

The number of **veterans** experiencing homelessness has **remained unchanged from 2017** (45 in 2018 vs. 45 in 2017).

Forty-two percent (**42%**) of **veterans** experiencing homelessness indicate they **have a mental illness** versus twenty-nine percent (29%) of the total homeless population in the bi-county region.

FIGURE 19. DISABLED PERSONS BY SHELTER TYPE

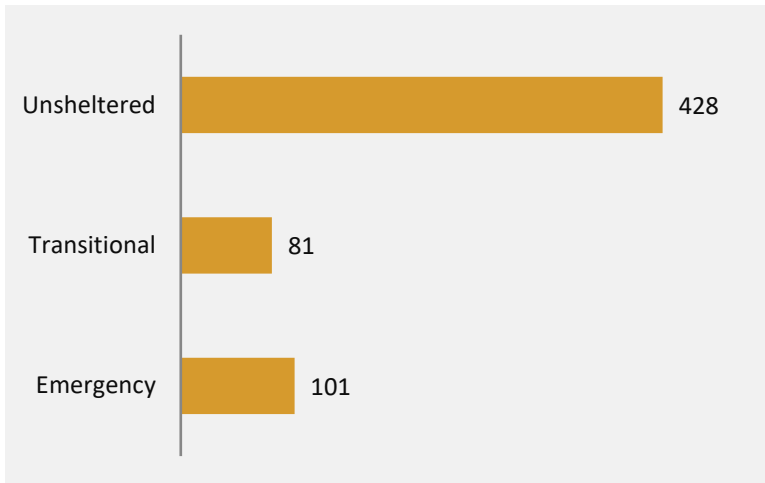


FIGURE 20. DISABLING CONDITION BY GENDER

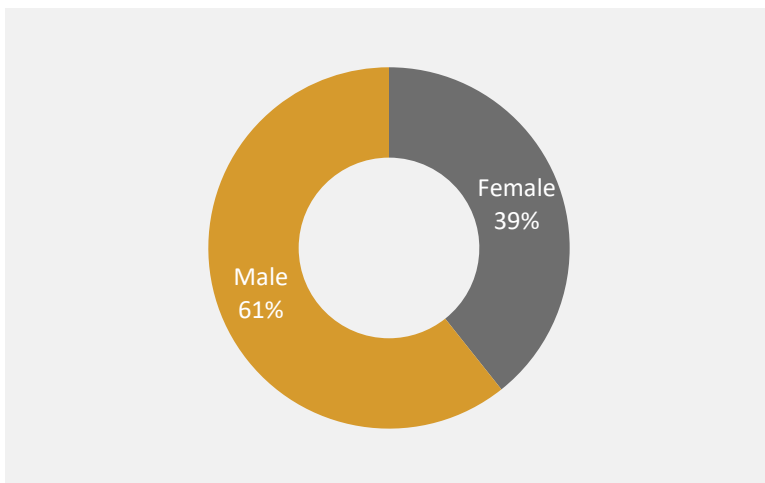
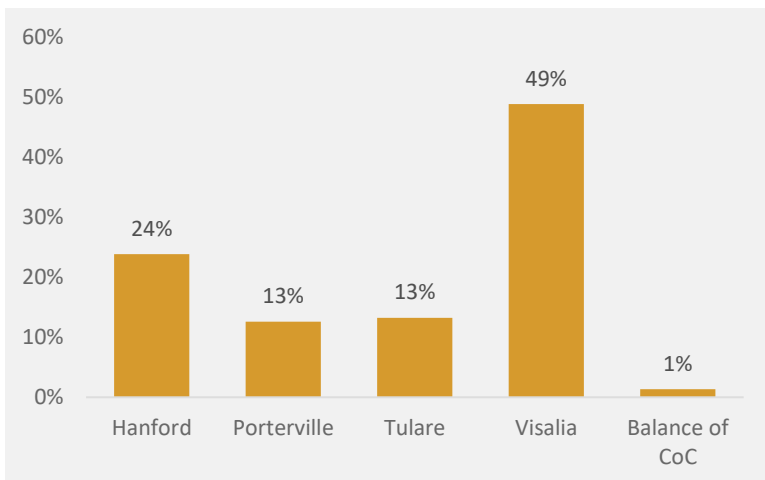


FIGURE 21. DISABLING CONDITION BY CITY



Disabling Conditions

Of the 807 adults who responded to the disabling condition questions, one out of every two indicated they **suffer from a disabling condition (52%)**.

Nearly one-third of the respondents indicate they **have a mental health condition (29%)**.

Sheltered adults suffer from disabling conditions at a **far lower rate (26%)** than their **unsheltered counterparts (58%)**.

Almost two-thirds (**62%**) of people experiencing homeless **with a disabling condition indicate they have no financial resources**.

Eight out of every ten (82%) people with a disabling condition **are sleeping in a place not meant for human habitation**.

FIGURE 22. SOURCES OF INCOME

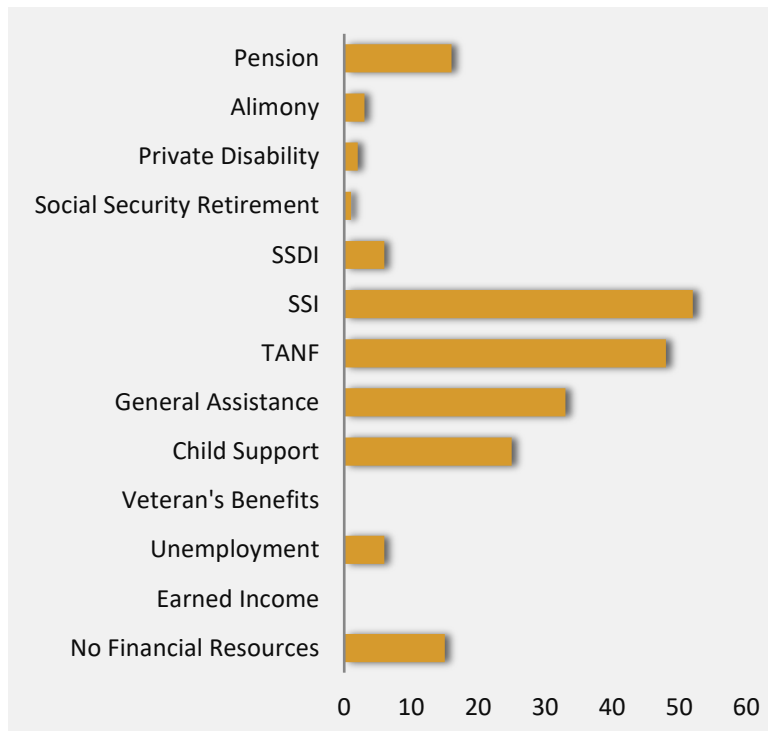
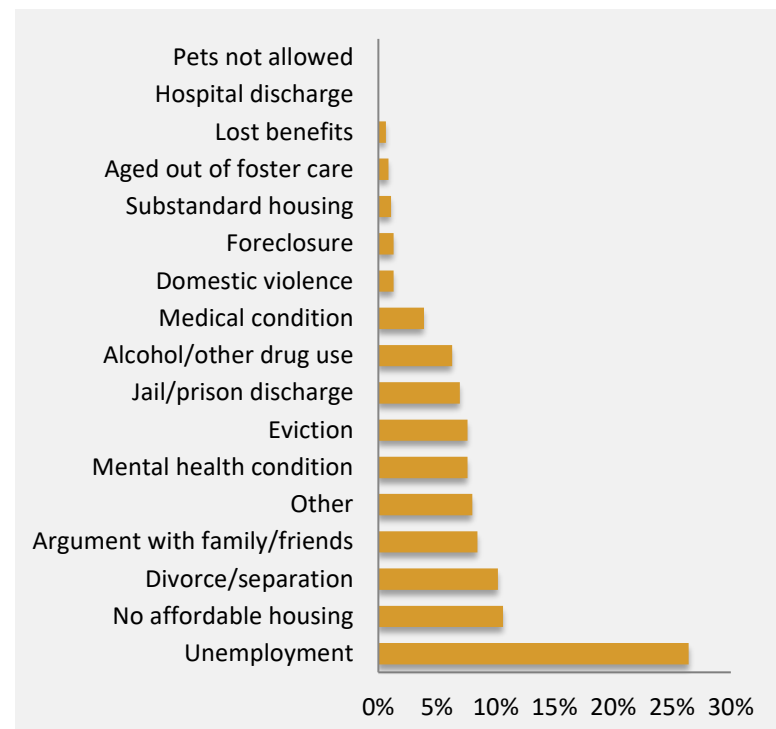


FIGURE 23. REASONS CITED FOR HOMELESSNESS



Sources of Income[^]

Of those responding to the income question, **the highest percentage were receiving SSI (8%) or SSDI (8%)**, followed by TANF (5%) and General Assistance (4%).

Sixty-nine percent (69%) of respondents indicated that they **did not have any financial resources**.

Reasons for Homelessness[^]

Unemployment continues to be the **most common reason cited for people experiencing unsheltered homelessness (28% or 164 adult respondents)**.

Eviction was the second highest reason given **as reason for homelessness (12% or 71 adult respondents)**.

FIGURE 24. HOMELESSNESS TREND BY COUNTY, 2009-2018

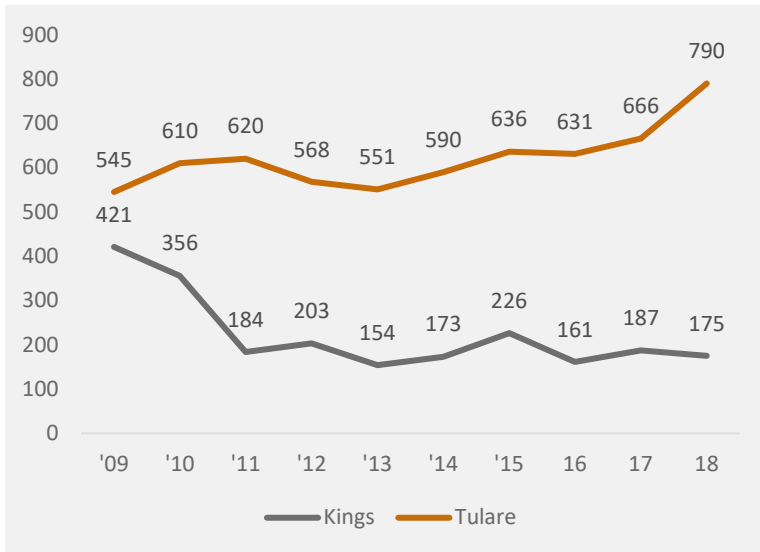
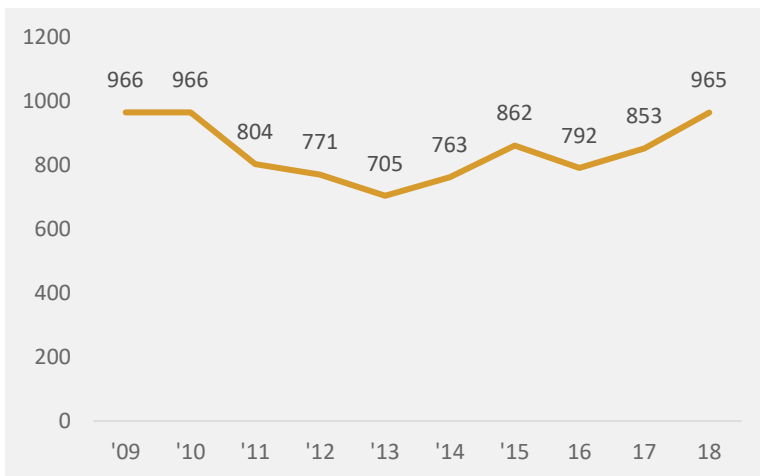


FIGURE 25. HOMELESSNESS TREND, 2009-2018



Trend over Time

Homelessness in Tulare County has risen by 245 people since 2009 or a 45% increase (790 in 2018 vs. 545 in 2009).

Kings County homelessness has decreased by 234 people since 2009, or a 59% reduction (175 in 2018 vs. 421 in 2009). However, homelessness has remained virtually unchanged since 2011 (175 in 2018 vs. 184 in 2011).

The number of people experiencing **homelessness** in Kings and Tulare Counties **has returned to its highest point in 2009** (965 in 2018 vs. 966 in 2009).

On the night of January 24, 2018, **there were 231 people residing in PSH & RRH beds that would have otherwise been counted as homeless.**

FIGURE 26. HOUSING INVENTORY, 2017-2018

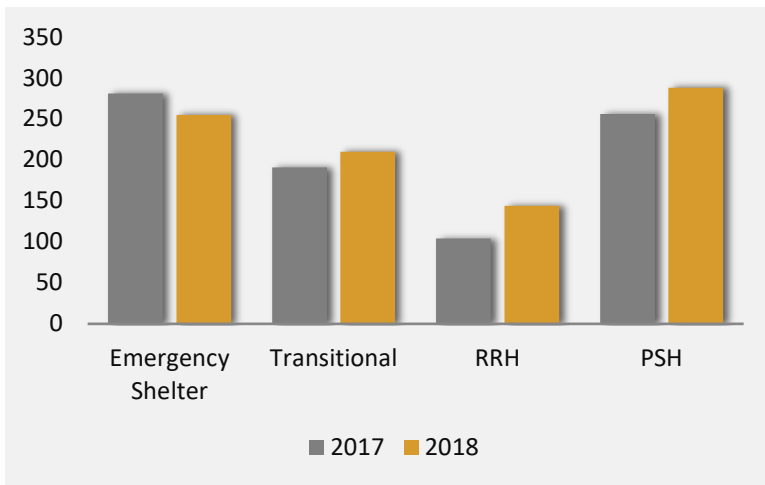
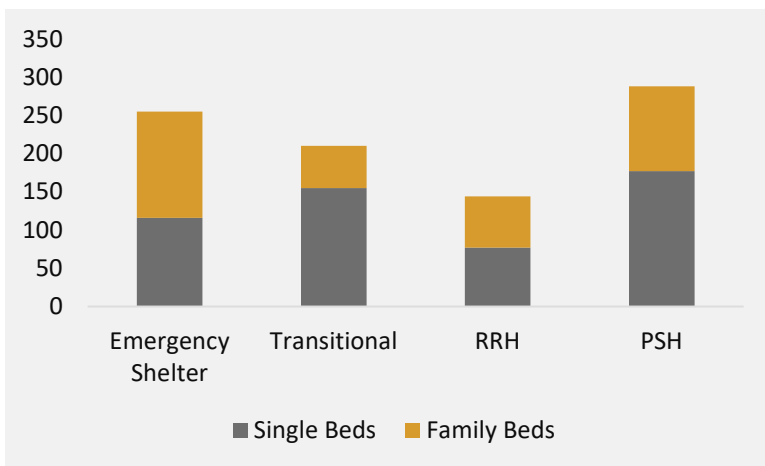


FIGURE 27. HOUSING INVENTORY, SINGLE VS FAMILY BEDS



Bed Capacity and Unmet Needs

On the night of the PIT, **the bi-county region had 237 Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) beds and 18 Rapid Re-Housing (RRH) beds available** to serve people experiencing homelessness. An additional 51 PSH and 126 RRH beds were under development.

Many of the housing programs are restricted to certain sub-populations such as victims of domestic violence, transition-age youth, veterans, or chronically homeless.

The **development of additional Permanent Supportive Housing and Rapid Re-Housing beds** continue to **remain a top priority** for program development in the region.

Looking Ahead

Together with its partners, the Alliance has undertaken a number of targeted strategies to combat homelessness within the region and maximize the limited resources available.

Efforts include:

- Continuing to prioritize low-barrier housing with a housing first approach for people experiencing homelessness;
- Utilizing the coordinated entry system to prioritize those most in need for housing assistance;
- Hosting monthly case management roundtables to staff cases, share best practices, and strategize on housing placements;
- Creating a Landlord Mitigation Fund, which is designed to incentivize Landlords to relax screening criteria for people who are experiencing homelessness and who may have barriers that prevent them from securing housing on their own, such as poor credit and past evictions;
- Implementing a diversion strategy aimed at preventing homelessness for people seeking shelter by helping them identify immediate alternate housing arrangements and, if necessary, connecting them with services and financial assistance to help them return to permanent housing; and
- Collaborating with mainstream benefit agencies to leverage other homeless assistance programs such as Bringing Families Home, Housing Support Program, and the Homeless Disability Advocacy Program.

Appendix A – Definitions

Child Only Households

Households where all members are under the age of 18.

Chronically Homeless (CH)

Individual or head of household with a disability who lives in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter; and who has either been continuously homeless for at least 12 months or has experienced at least four episodes of homelessness in the last 3 years where the combined occasions total at least 12 months. Occasions are separated by a break of at least seven nights. Stays in institutions of fewer than 90 days do not constitute a break.

Continuum of Care

Local planning body responsible for coordinating the full range of homelessness services in a geographic area, which may cover a city, county, metropolitan area, or even an entire state.

Couch Surfing

Describes situations where runaway or homeless youth are living in unstable and/or temporary living arrangements such as the couches or spare bedrooms of friends, lovers, or other family members⁶.

Disabling Condition

Any one of (1) a disability as defined in Section 223 of the Social Security Act; (2) a physical, mental, or emotional impairment which is (a) expected to be of long-continued and indefinite duration, (b) substantially impedes an individual's ability to live independently, and (c) of a nature that such ability could be improved by more suitable housing conditions; (3) a developmental disability as defined in Section 102 of the Developmental Disabilities

Assistance and Bill of Rights Act; (4) the disease of acquired immunodeficiency syndrome or any conditions arising from the etiologic agency for acquired immunodeficiency syndrome; or (5) a diagnosable substance abuse disorder.

Emergency Shelter

A facility with the primary purpose of providing temporary shelter for homeless people.

Homeless Person

An individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence and seek shelter in places not meant for habitation such as cars, camps, streets and abandoned buildings. Public or privately operated congregate emergency shelters are also places that house persons and families who are experiencing a housing crisis.

Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)

A software application designed to record and store client-level information on the characteristics and service needs of homeless people. Each CoC maintains its own HMIS, which can be tailored to meet local needs, but must also conform to HUD's HMIS Data and Technical Standards.

Households with Adults and Children

People who are homeless as part of households that have at least one adult and one child under the age of 18.

Households with Adults Only

Households with single adults and adult couples unaccompanied by children under the age of 18.

Housing Inventory Chart (HIC)

A report on the capacity to house persons who are homeless.

Parenting Youth

Youth (under age 25) who identify as the parent or legal guardian of one or more children who are present with or sleeping in the same place as that youth parent.

Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)

Designed to provide housing and supportive services on a long-term basis to formerly homeless people that have a disabling condition.

Point in Time Count (PIT)

An unduplicated one-night estimate of both sheltered and unsheltered homeless populations.

Rapid Re-Housing (RRH)

A program that provides financial assistance and services to help those experiencing homelessness to be quickly re-housed and stabilized. This is considered permanent housing.

Sheltered Homeless People

People who are living in a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designated to provide temporary living arrangements (including congregate shelters, transitional housing, and hotels and motels paid for by charitable organizations or by federal, state, or local government programs for low-income individuals.)

Transitional Housing (TH)

A program that provides temporary housing and supportive services for up to 24 months with the intent for the person to move towards permanent housing.

Unaccompanied Youth

People who are not part of a family during their episode of homelessness and who are between the ages of 18 and 24.

Unsheltered Homeless People

People with a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings.

Veteran

Someone who has served on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States.

Victims of Domestic Violence

This subpopulation category includes persons who have been victims of domestic violence at any point in the past.

CLIENT INFORMED CONSENT/RELEASE OF INFORMATION AUTHORIZATION

When you request or receive services from a participating agency, we collect information about you and your household and enter it into a database system called the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). This system helps us to better understand homelessness, to improve service delivery, and to evaluate the effectiveness of services provided to the homeless and those at-risk of homelessness.

What information is collected and what happens to it?

Depending on your situation, you may be asked:

- Basic identifying information (may include name, SSN, date of birth, gender, race, marital and family status, household relationships, phone numbers, military veteran status, whether or not you have a disability)
- Housing information (may include address, type of housing, homeless status, and reason for homelessness)
- Income information (sources and amounts of household income, employment information, work skills)
- Legal history/information
- Medical information
- Services needed and provided; outcomes of services
- Details of your medical/health status will never be shared between Partner Agencies using HMIS, without written consent.
- With your approval, information collected is shared with authorized personnel at Partner Agencies.
- Collectively, data on the homeless population in Kings and Tulare counties (but not personal identifying information) is used in statewide reports on homelessness.

NOTE: HMIS uses many security protections to ensure confidentiality and only Partner Agencies who have signed an Interagency Network Data Sharing Agreement have access. A list of Partner Agencies can be found on our website at www.kingstularecoc.org.

Why should you agree to have your information shared with HMIS Partner Agencies?

By sharing your information with these agencies, you will help them:

- Identify other services or programs you may be eligible for,
- Better coordinate services for you and your household,
- More accurately count the number of homeless persons, services available and services needed,
- Show the people who fund homeless programs that the services are needed and
- Obtain other funding for programs that serve homeless persons.

You have the option to restrict access to personal information that you are providing about yourself and your minor children. You may modify this consent with respect to the sharing of your information at any time.

Please treat information about my children age 17 or younger the same as mine.

This consent will expire seven (7) years from the date signed. You may cancel this authorization at any time by written request, but the cancellation will not be retroactive.

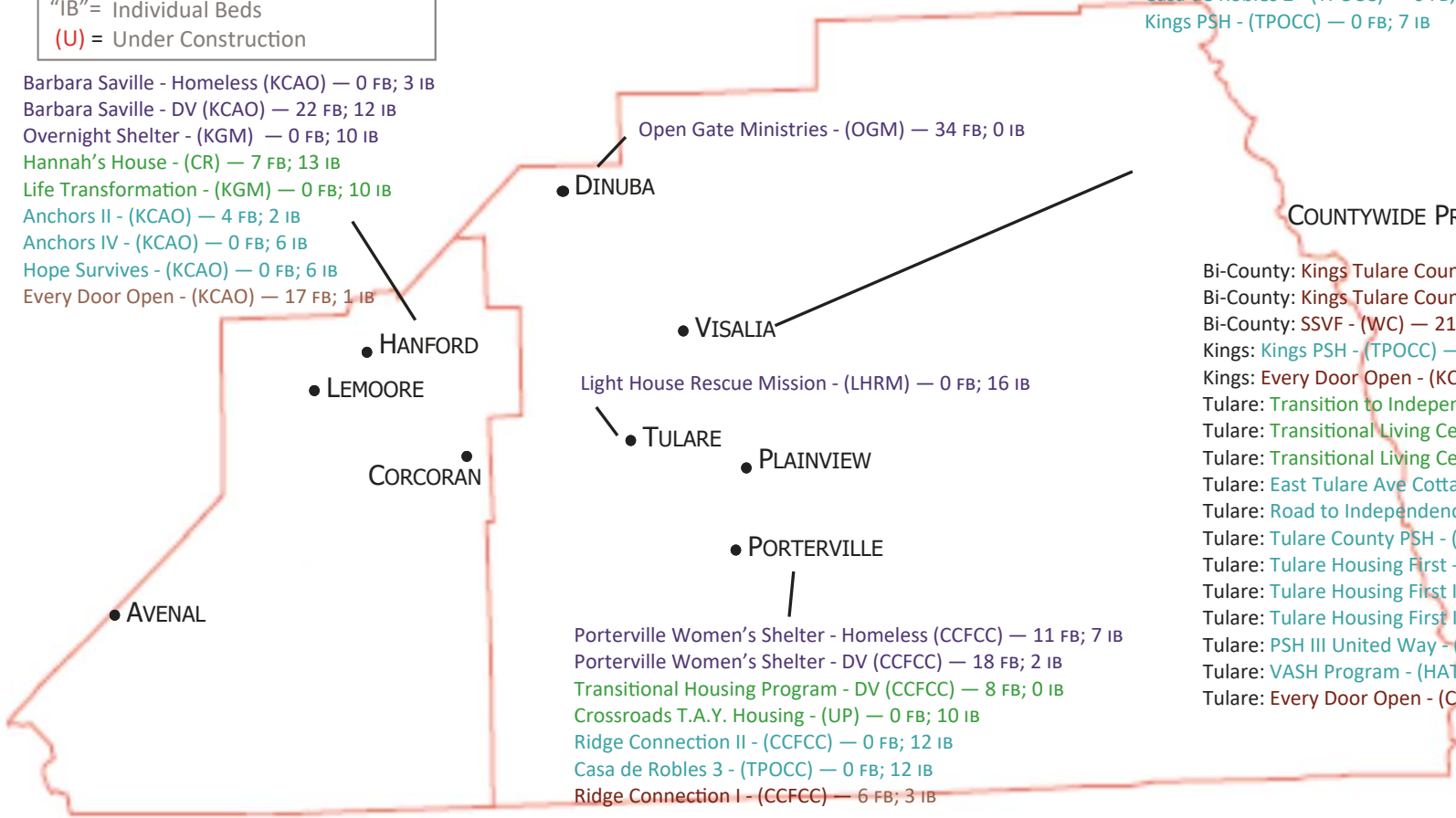
